Admissions arrangements for the Harrogate area

The area

Harrogate Local Education Office covers the same area as that maintained by Harrogate Borough Council, with the exception of: Burton-on-Yore, Colsterdale, Ellingstring, Ellington High & Low, Fearby, Healey, Ilton-cum-Pott, Masham and Swinton-with-Warthermarske. These parishes are supported by the Northallerton Education Office. The Harrogate Local Education Office therefore covers from North Stainley in the north to Leathley in the south, and from Lofthouse in the west to Tockwith in the east.

Primary schools – community and voluntary-controlled

The primary schools in the Harrogate administrative area are listed from page 13 to 19. Information about the schools, maximum admission limit, number of pupils admitted for the 2007/08 academic year and percentage of parents first preference for the school; and, if relevant numbers of statutory admission appeals can be found here.

Pupils who live in the civil parish of Moor Monkton normally attend Upper Poppleton Infant and Junior Schools, which are maintained by York Educational Services. Preferences for these schools should be made on a North Yorkshire common application form. A copy of this will be sent by the Harrogate Local Education Office to York Educational Services, who deal with admissions to these schools. Any enquiries should be addressed to their office.

St Peter's Brafferton CE (VA) Primary

Denomination: Church of England

Admission Policy 2008/2009

St Peter's Brafferton CE VA Primary School is a Church of England Voluntary Aided School in the Diocese of York, maintained by North Yorkshire Local Authority (LA). As the Church is closely involved with our school, we aim to provide an environment in which faith is respected and honoured and that spiritual dimension of both adults and children is nurtured in a way that respects the beliefs and integrity of the whole school community.

The Governing Body is responsible for admissions to the school, guided by the requirements of law; the school trust deed; advice from the Diocesan Board of Education and its duty to the community.

Making an application

Routine Admissions

Applications for admission to the school should be made on the common application form and supplementary forms enclosed with the LA's brochure, which is sent out in October 2007. Alternatively these forms may be completed on-line. It will not normally be possible to change the order of your preferences for schools after the closing date in December 2007.

A school admission form should also be completed and returned to the school by December 14th 2007. These are available from the school office of 'playmates' the on-site nursery.

The address used on the admission form must be the current one at the time of application. If the address changes subsequently, the parents should notify the school. Where the parents live at different addresses, the current-at-the-time-of-application, normal address of the child will be the one used. This will normally be the one where the child wakes up for the majority of Monday to Friday mornings. Parents may be asked to show evidence of the claim that is being made for the address, e.g. identity cards of various sorts showing the child's address as the one claimed. Where there is dispute about the correct address to use, the governors reserve the right to make enquiries of any relevant third parties, e.g. the child's GP. For children of UK Service personnel and other Crown Servants returning to the area, proof of the posting is all that is required.

Non-routine admissions

It sometimes happens that a child needs to change school other than at the "normal" time; such admissions are known as non-routine admissions. Parents wishing their child to attend this school should arrange to visit the school. They will be provided with an application form once they have a definite local address. If there is a place in the appropriate class, then the governors will arrange for the admission to take place. If there is no place, then the admissions committee will consider the application, and information about how to appeal against a refusal will be provided. Appeals for children moving into the area will not be considered until there is evidence of a permanent address, e.g. exchange of contracts or tenancy agreement with rent book. Please note that you cannot re-apply for a place at a school within the same school year unless there has been relevant, significant and material change in the family circumstances.

Allocating places

The Governors' policy is to admit all children, whose fifth birthday falls between 1 September and 31 August, at the beginning of the Autumn Term. A brochure about the school is available and parents of prospective pupils are warmly invited to make an appointment with the head teacher to visit the school. Last year the school admitted all pupils whose parents applied.

The Admission Limit for September 2008 is 10.

If the number of applications exceeds 10, the Governing Body use the following criteria, in strict order of priority, to allocate places:

1. Children in Care, children with statements of special educational needs naming the school, or special medical or social circumstances affecting the child where these needs can only be met at this school.

Note: Supporting evidence from a professional, eg a doctor, psychologist, social worker, is essential if admission is to be made under the criterion for special medical or social circumstances, and such evidence must set out the particular reasons why the school in question is the most suitable school and the difficulties which would be caused if the child had to attend another school.

2. Children normally resident within the ecclesiastical parishes of Brafferton With Pilmoor and Myton-on-Swale, who have a brother or sister* who will be a registered pupil of the school at the proposed date of admission for this school.

Note: A map showing the boundaries is available in school.

3. Other children normally resident within the ecclesiastical parishes of Brafferton with Pilmoor and Myton-on-Swale.
4. Children normally resident outside the ecclesiastical parishes of Brafferton with Pilmoor and Myton-on-Swale who have a brother or sister* who will be a registered pupil of the school at the proposed date of admission.



5. Children whose parents are regular worshipping members of St Peter's Church in Brafferton, St Mary's Church in Myton or St Mary Magdalene's Church at Thormanby and whose names are entered on the Church's Electoral Roll.

Note: Regular worshipping member is defined as attending any of the Churches at least once a month for at least a year, verified by a supporting letter from the minister.

6. Other Children.

Note 1: Where there are more applicants for the available places in any category, then distances to home front door from the main gate of the school, in a straight line, measured on a map, will be used as the final determining factor, nearer addresses having priority over more distant ones.

**Note 2: 'Brother or sister' includes step, half, foster, adopted brothers and sisters living at the same address and full brothers and sisters living apart.*

All parents who express a preference before the closing date of December 2007 will receive a single offer of a school place on a designated date set by the co-ordinated scheme for admission arrangements. Details of this scheme can be obtained from the Authority.

Late applications will be considered in accordance with the above policy.

Appeals

Parents who are not given the preferred place for their child will be informed of the reason and offered an alternative place. Parents have a right to appeal to an independent panel. Where the governors are unable to offer a place because the school is over subscribed, parents have the right to appeal to an independent admission appeal panel, set up under the School Standards and Framework Act 1998, as amended by the Education Act, 2002. Parents should notify the clerk to the governors at the school within 14 days of receiving the letter refusing a place. Parents will have the opportunity to submit their case to the panel in writing and also to attend, in order to present their case. You will normally receive 14 days' notice of the place and time of the hearing.

Fraudulent applications

Where the governing body discovers that a child has been awarded a place as the result of an intentionally misleading application from a parent (for example a false claim to residence in the catchment area or of involvement in a place of worship) which effectively denies a place to a child with a stronger claim, then the governing body is required to withdraw the offer of the place. The application will be considered afresh and a right of appeal offered if a place is refused.

Deferred admission

If your child is due to start school during the next academic year, it is important that you apply for a place for September. If your child's fifth birthday is between the months of September and December, then, if you wish it, admission may be deferred until January: if it is between January and April, then admission may be deferred until the start of the summer term though it is likely to be in your child's interest to start no later than January.

Twins

Where there are twins wanting admission and there is only a single place left within the admission number, then the governing body will exercise as much flexibility as possible within the requirements of infant class sizes (the legal Infant Class Size is 30). If only one place can be offered then parents will be advised that the place will be offered to the older twin. Parents should go to appeal for the other twin, though with the Infant Class Size legislation, it is unlikely that an appeal panel will overturn the decision of the governing body.

Burnt Yates CE Primary School

Denomination: Church of England

Burnt Yates is a Voluntary Aided Church of England Primary School. As a church school it is committed to maintaining links with the local parish and the Diocese of Ripon and Leeds. The School welcomes children from other Christian denominations and other faiths. It serves the local community and aims to teach Christian values and standards and to demonstrate these qualities in everyday life.

The school can accommodate up to 56 children within the regulatory conditions set by North Yorkshire Education Authority. The governors will admit up to 8 children of Reception age. Should there be more applications than places available, the governors will allocate places according to the following criteria, which will be applied in the sequence in which they are set out.

Criteria for admission

1. Children with Special Educational Needs naming our school on their statement of educational needs
2. Children in public care for whom the school has been expressed as a preference.
3. Any child who resides within the area of Burt Yates, Clint and Hartwith.
4. Any child with siblings attending the school.
5. Any child from an Anglican family who resides outside the area, on the recommendation of their priest.
Note: An Anglican family is one that worships regularly in the Church of England.
6. Any child from another Christian denomination or other faith community, on the recommendation of their minister.



7. Any child with proven educational, medical or social needs which leads to governors to conclude that they should be admitted.
8. Any child who does not qualify on the criteria above.

Admission of pupils

Wherever possible it is preferable for children to visit the school before they are admitted in order to get to know the teachers and the building. New entrants are gradually admitted to the FS/KS 1 class. Additionally children are admitted from other schools at the beginning of terms and throughout the school year.

Admission dates

Generally pupils are admitted to the infant class, part-time in September, full-time after the Autumn half-term holiday.

Appeals

Appeals against the decision of the governing body not to offer a place must be made in writing to the Clerk of the Governors and sent to the school by the end of April prior to the academic year starting in September. An Appeal Panel will be convened at the earliest possible date following receipt of an appeal letter, and parents will be notified of their decision in writing as soon as possible thereafter.

Dacre Braithwaite CE School

Denomination: Church of England

Admissions Policy 2008 – 2009

Dacre Braithwaite is a Voluntary Aided Church of England Primary School. As a Church school it is committed to maintaining close links with the local parish and the Diocese of Ripon and Leeds. Its teaching is mainly Christian in character, and seeks to serve the needs of children who are members of the Anglican Church, but also the primary educational requirements of the community in general.

The school can accommodate up to 70 children within the regulatory conditions set by North Yorkshire Education Authority for the safe and proper teaching of children in the Infant and Junior age ranges. Normally, the Governors will admit no more than 10 children of foundation age. Children are admitted in the September of the year in which they are five. Once a child has been offered a place under its admission criteria, the school reserves the right to negotiate with parents, an appropriate induction timetable. To enable the child to settle happily, he or she may visit the school several half days in the half term before he/she is due to start, and will attend on a part-time basis during his/her first weeks of school.

Should there be more applications than there are places available, then the Governors will allocate places according to the following criteria, which will be applied in the priority sequence in which they are set out. Only applications made according to the process set out below will be considered.

1. Any child with a Statement of Special Educational Needs which names the school.*
2. Any child looked after by the Local Authority.*
3. Any child of a family who are at the heart of the Anglican church within the United Parish of Dacre with Hartwith and Darley with Thornwaite, supported by a written reference. (attend twice a month or more).
4. Any child of a family who are attached to the Anglican church within the United Parish of Dacre with Hartwith and Darley with Thornthwaite, supported by a written reference. (attend once a month on average)
5. Any child of a family who are known to the Anglican church within the United Parish of Dacre with Hartwith and Darley with Thornthwaite, supported by a written reference. (attend very occasionally perhaps for special events)
6. Any child with siblings already in the school.
7. Any child who resides within the geographical area that includes parts of Thornthwaite, Dacre, Padside, Greenhow, and West End. This defines the historical catchment area of the school (a map showing details can be viewed in the school office).
8. Any child who resides in the United Parish of Dacre with Hartwith and Darley with Thornthwaite.
9. Any child from another Christian Denomination or other faith community, supported by a reference from their minister.
10. Any other child living beyond the above boundaries.

(Please note the 1 and 2* are statutory requirements which apply to all schools. In the event of over subscription, the above criteria will be applied in order, until all available places are filled. If there are more applicants than places in any category then those living closest to the school, using the nearest transport route, will receive priority).*

An Application Form and NYCC Application pack for Enrolment should be requested from the Headteacher of Dacre Braithwaite School at the start of the Autumn Term prior to the academic year in which the child should commence in the Foundation Class. The school application form should be returned to school on the date indicated by NYCC in the information pack provided, and should be accompanied by a short statement explaining why the parents believe that their child should be considered for a place at Dacre Braithwaite School.

County Council preference forms should be also completed and returned to the school with applications. Parents will be notified, in writing, of the outcome of their application by the local authority. Those successful will be invited to visit the school in the summer term.



Information about appeals against placements will be provided by the Local Authority. Appeals will be conducted in accordance with the latest statutory advice.

Please contact the Headteacher if you have any concerns regarding this policy or have not received any relevant information or application forms.

Farnley CE Primary

Kirkby Overblow All Saints CE Primary

Denomination: Church of England

Admissions Policy 2008/2009

All Saints is a Voluntary Aided Church of England Primary School. As a Church School it is committed to maintaining close links with the local parish and the Diocese of Ripon & Leeds. The school welcomes children from other Christian traditions. It serves the local community and aims to teach Christian values and standards of behaviour and to demonstrate these qualities in everyday life.

The school can accommodate up to 84 children within the regulatory conditions set by the North Yorkshire Education Authority. Normally, the governors will admit no more than 12 children of Reception age. Should there be more applications than there are places available, then the governors will allocate places according to the following criteria which will be applied in the sequence in which they are set out.

1. Any child with a statement of special educational needs (SEN) where the statement specifically names the school.
2. Children in Public Care, which includes foster care, for whom the school has been expressed as a preference.
3. Any child who resides within the catchment area of the school who has a brother or sister who will still be on roll at the start of the school year. (A map showing the catchment area is available in school).
4. Any other child with a brother or sister who will still be on roll at the start of the school year.
5. Any child who resides within the Parish of Kirkby Overblow with Sicklinghall.
6. Any child who resides within the Parish of Weeton with North Rigton & Stainburn.

7. Any child from a practising Christian family on the recommendation of their priest/minister. Level of involvement with Church should be defined (see below)*.
8. If further places remain, we will consider any other applications for admission.

Where the offer of places to all the applicants in any of the sub-categories listed above would still lead to over-subscription, the places up to the admission number will be offered to those living nearest to the school.

*Level of involvement with the Church should be defined as one of the following three categories – At the Heart of the Church:

- Family worships twice a month or more
- May be regularly involved in, or even lead, some Church activities
- Take account of those who have regular shift or work patterns

Attached to the Church

- Regular but not frequent worshipper – perhaps attending monthly family service
- May be involved in weekday Church activities, perhaps involving element of worship – e.g. occasional Bible Study Group

Known to the Church

- Occasional but not frequent worshipper – e.g. three times a year
- Defining the family connection – e.g. all children in the family baptised there
- Involved in the non – worship Church activities – e.g. uniformed organisations linked to the Church

Admission Procedure

Parents can register interest in a place for their child at any time by contacting the school office. In the Autumn Term prior to the academic year in which your child will commence in a Reception class, parents need to complete a Common Application Form for the Local Authority. We will send this form out to parents who have expressed interest in a place for their child at our school. Alternatively, these can be obtained from the Harrogate Education Office. The LA will notify parents on our behalf as to whether or not their application has been successful.

Appeals against the governors' decision not to offer a place must be lodged by the parents, in writing, with the Committee Services Unit at North Yorkshire County Council, within 14 days of the parents receiving notice that their child will not be offered a place. These appeals will be considered by an Independent Appeal Panel and the parents notified, in writing, of their decision.

It is the policy of the governors to admit children full time in the Autumn Term if their 5th birthday falls between 1st September and 31st December. Children who are 5 between 1st January and 31st August will attend school on a part time basis from September and commence full time following the half-term holiday.



There is a familiarisation programme arranged for children and parents in the weeks before admission to school, details of which will be outlined at the Information Evening for parents of new entrants, in the Summer term.

Parents of prospective pupils are warmly invited to make an appointment to visit the school.

Marton-Cum-Grafton CE Primary

Denomination: Church of England

Nun Monkton Foundation Primary School

Admissions Criteria 2008-9

The maximum Admission Limit for Nun Monkton Foundation Primary School is 4. The Maximum Capacity is 35.

1. Children in public care for whom the school has been expressed as a preference
2. Priority will always be given to children living within the catchment area. This area is defined as the village and the farms nearby which are bounded by the River Nidd on the south side and River Ouse on the north east side and includes the community of Widdington, the Skipbridge Farm complex and Gowlands complex. Every effort will be made to accommodate village residents.
3. Siblings¹ of present school pupils.
4. Children we can support for a special medical or social reason, supported by professional recommendation of a doctor.
5. First come, first served. In the event of over-subscription at this stage, families closest to the school² will be given priority.

In the event of children being unsuccessful in gaining a place, parents have a statutory right to appeal. The appeal would be heard by an independent Admission Appeal panel.

¹A sibling of a present pupil will be permanently living in the same household.

²The distance will be measured from the front door of school to the front door of the pupil's dwelling by the most plausible route.

Richard Taylor CE Aided Primary, Harrogate

Denomination: Church of England

Admission Policy

Richard Taylor is a voluntary aided Church of England Primary School. As such, it is committed to the teaching of the Christian faith. Since this character of the School distinguishes it from other schools within the area, in the case of over-subscription, preference will normally be given to applications from parents who can demonstrate their sympathy with the aims of the Mission statement.

The School comprises a maximum of 273 pupils. In any one academic year up to 39 children are admitted at the commencement of the school year in which their fifth birthday falls. Should there be more applications than places available, places will be allocated by the Governing Body using the following criteria, which are listed in order of priority:

1. Children in care, children with statements of special educational needs, naming the school or medical or social circumstances affecting the child where these needs can only be met at the school.

Note: Professional supporting evidence from e.g. a doctor, psychologist, social worker is essential if admission is to be made under the criterion for special medical or social circumstances and such evidence must set out the particular reasons why the school in question is the most suitable school and the difficulties which would be caused if the child had to attend another school.

2. Children who have a brother or sister who will be attending the school at the date of the proposed admission.

Note: Siblings include step, half, foster, adopted brothers and sisters, living at the same address and full brothers and sisters living apart.

3. Children of parents who attend the place of worship (Christian worship) appropriate to their faith (denomination). The criteria for church attendance is defined below in order of priority:
 - a) At the heart of the church: families who worship twice a month or more, taking account of irregular shift or work patterns. These families will be regularly involved in church activities and may even lead some activities.
 - b) Attached to the church: families who are regular but not frequent worshippers, for example attending monthly for family services. They may also be involved in weekday church activities, which include an element of worship.
 - c) Known to the church: families who are occasional but not frequent worshippers. They may have family connections with the church. They may be involved in non worship church activities e.g. uniformed organisations linked to the church.
4. Other children



Tie-breaker

Where there are more applicants for the available places within a category, distance from home to school will be the deciding factor, with preference given to those whose home address is nearest to the school when measured from the front door to the main entrance of the school using the shortest safe walking distance.

Application forms for each school year will be sent to parents at the beginning of the previous spring term (i.e. in the January prior to the academic year in which their child's fifth birthday falls).

Children with fifth birthdays between 1 September and 31 August will be offered a place from 1st September. Those children with 5th birthdays between 1st September and 28/29th February should be full time from the beginning of the academic year in which they are 5. Those with 5th birthdays between 1st March and 31st August should be full time from the January of the year in which they are 5. The only variance should be on compassionate grounds and these must be substantiated by a letter from a doctor or social worker. The start of the year and the transition from part time to full time will be staggered on each occasion.

Parents are welcome to contact the school to arrange a visit before they apply. New entrants will be invited to visit the school in the term before they start.

All applications for admission will be considered by the Admission Panel consisting of three governors and the headteacher. Parents/carers will be informed in writing by the LA who will write on behalf of the governing body of the decision of the panel. Should an application be unsuccessful the parent/carers will be advised that they have the right of appeal.

St Joseph's Catholic Primary School, Harrogate

Denomination: Catholic

Admission Policy – 2008-2009

St Joseph's Catholic Primary School, Harrogate was founded by the Catholic Church to provide education for baptised Catholic children. The school is conducted by its governing body as part of the Catholic church in accordance with its Trust Deed and Instrument of Government and seeks at all times to be a witness to Jesus Christ.

Whenever there are more applications than places available, priority will always be given to Catholic applicants in accordance with the over-subscription criteria listed below. In expressing a preference for St Joseph's Catholic Primary School, parents/guardians are declaring their support for the aims and ethos of the school.

The governing body has responsibility for admissions to this school and intends to admit 30 pupils to Reception in the school year 2008-2009

Over-subscription criteria

At any time where there are more applications for places than the number of places available, places will be offered according to the following order of priority:

1. Looked after children from Catholic families.
2. Baptised Catholics who are resident in the parish of St Joseph's.
3. Other baptised Catholic children.
4. Other looked after children.
5. Children of other Christian denominations or of other Faiths whose parents are in sympathy with the aims and ethos of the school and whose application is supported by a minister of religion or an appropriate religious leader.
6. Children whose parents are in sympathy with the aims and ethos of the school.
7. Other children whose parents/guardians wish them to attend St Joseph's School.
8. Catechumens and members of an Eastern Christian Church are to be given priority next after baptised Catholics in each of the above categories.

Where the offer of places to all the applicants in any of the categories listed above would lead to over-subscription, the following provisions will be applied.

The attendance of a brother or sister at the school at the time of enrolment will increase the priority of an application within each category.

Tie Break

Where the offer of places to all applicants in any of the sub-categories listed above would still lead to over-subscription, the places up to the admission number will be offered to those living nearest to the school. "Walking distance" will be used as the measure.

Application Procedures and Timetable

Applications must be submitted by 1 December, 2007 to the school's Administrator at the school on the Supplementary Information Form attached to this policy.

A standard application form, known as the Common Preference Form must also be completed and returned to the Local Education Authority at

Parents will be advised of the outcome of their applications by letter dated 25 April, 2008. Unsuccessful applicants will be given reasons related to the over-subscription criteria and advised of their right to appeal to an independent appeal panel.

Applicants are requested to note that applications will be invalid unless **BOTH** the forms described above have been completed and received at the correct addresses.



Waiting lists

In addition to their right to appeal, unsuccessful candidates will be offered the opportunity to be placed on a waiting list. This waiting list will be maintained in order of the over-subscription criteria set out above and not in the order in which applications are received or added to the list. Names are normally removed from the list after six months.

Pupils with a Statement of Special Educational Needs

The admission of pupils with a statement of Special Educational Needs is dealt with by a completely separate procedure. This procedure is integral to the making and maintaining of statements by the pupil's home Local Authority. Details of this separate procedure are set out in the Special Educational Needs Code of Practice.

St Joseph's Catholic Primary School, Bishop Thornton

Denomination: Catholic

Admission Policy 2008- 2009

Saint Joseph's Catholic Primary School was founded by the Catholic Church to provide education for baptised Catholic children. The school is conducted by its governing body as part of the Catholic Church in accordance with its Trust Deed and Instrument of Government and seeks at all times to be witness to Jesus Christ.

Whenever there are more applications than places available, priority will always be given to Catholic applicants in accordance with the over-subscription criteria listed below. In expressing a preference for St Joseph's parents/guardians are declaring their support for the aims and ethos of the school.

The governing body has responsibility for admissions to this school and the Maximum Admissions Limited for 2008-09 is set at 8 pupils.

Over-subscription Criteria

At any time where there are more applications for places than the number of places available, places will be offered according to the following order of priority:

1. Looked after children from Catholic families.
2. Baptised Catholics who are resident in the parishes of St Joseph's, Bishop Thornton, Our Lady's, Pateley Bridge and Holy Family at Menwith Hill.
3. Other Baptised Catholic children.
4. Other looked after children
5. Children of other Christian denominations or of other Faiths whose parents are in sympathy with the aims and ethos of the school and whose application is supported by a minister of religion or an appropriate religious leader.
6. Children whose parents are in sympathy with the aims and ethos of the school.
7. Other children whose parents/guardians wish them to attend St Joseph's School.

Catechumens and members of an Eastern Christian Church are to be given priority next after baptised Catholics in each of the above categories.

Where the offer of places to all the applicants in any of the categories listed above would lead to over-subscription the following provisions will be applied.

The attendance of a brother or sister at the school at the time of enrolment will increase the priority of an application within each category.

Tie Break

Where the offer of places to all the applicants in any of the subcategories listed above would still lead to over-subscription, the places up to the admission number will be offered to those living nearest to the school. 'Straight line distance' will be used as the measure.

Over-subscription criteria

Where the offer of places to all the applicants in any of the categories listed above would lead to over-subscription the following terms would be applied.

The attendance of a brother or sister at the school at the time when the younger child starts school will increase the priority of an application within each category (see notes).



Tie break

Where the offer of places to all the applicants in any of the categories listed above would still lead to oversubscription, the available places will be offered to those living nearest to the school. 'Straight line distance' will be used as the measure (see notes).

Application Procedures and Timetable

Failure to provide a **Common Application Form (CAF)** would mean that the application is not valid and failure to provide a **Supplementary Information Form (SIF)** would mean that the applicant is placed in the last criteria.

Catechumens are those children who have given an explicit desire to be baptised into the Roman Catholic Church and who are currently preparing to receive the same by regular participation in Sunday worship and a recognised programme of preparation. A letter from the Catholic priest preparing the child is required.

Eastern Christian Church includes Orthodox Churches and proof is normally a certificate of baptism or reception from the authorities of that church.

Looked After Child has the same meaning as in section 22 of the Children Act 1989, and means any child in the care of a local authority or provided with accommodation by them (e.g. children with foster parents).
